

AVINITY RECEIVES MINNESOTA DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES GRANT

Richfield, MN - (11.18.2015) - Avinity Senior Living (“Avinity”) accepts the largest share of grant funds among a list of 62 recipients from the Minnesota Department of Human Services’ Live Well at Home grant program

Avinity has been awarded a two-year \$358,000 grant for its *Age Well: Partners in Technology-Driven Support for At-Risk Older Adults* project at LEE Center in Hibbing. The Minnesota Legislature and Governor Mark Dayton approved more than \$7 million in funding and the Minnesota Department of Human Services announced this month that it has awarded the funds to 62 different projects that provide services and support allowing aging Minnesotans to remain in their homes as long as possible, prolonging the need to move to more expensive settings.

Through the *Age Well* project, Avinity will collaborate with The Lutheran Home Association (TLHA) to develop robust educational and advocacy programming and is leveraging TLHA’s advanced expertise in health monitoring technology. Additionally, Avinity will partner with the Arrowhead Area Agency on Aging, which will promote the project and advocate for sustainability with local organizations serving seniors, including St. Louis County caseworkers. Together, this partnership and grant funding will provide remote health and safety monitoring systems to current residents of LEE Center in Hibbing, a Section 202 HUD Housing, Avinity Independent Senior Living Community that serves seniors with qualifying incomes. The program targets residents who are at risk of needing to move from their homes to a higher, more costly level of care.

Census data shows that Minnesota will experience a permanent shift in the age of its population over the next 25 years, and by 2030 the state will have 1.3 million people over the age of 65, about 20% of the state’s population. Specific to St. Louis County, by 2030, nearly 30% of the population over the age of 65 will live alone.

“Our experience in creating communities for low-income older adults that promote independence and community integration coupled with TLHA’s expertise in implementing health monitoring technology and program management and design, uniquely positions us to address this growing need,” said Jennifer Zarth, Vice President of Philanthropy & Programming for Avinity and author of the grant proposal.

The Advanced Health and Safety Remote Monitoring service, developed by Healthsense, Inc. of Mendota Heights, Minnesota, uses wireless sensors in a home setting to monitor everyday activities of daily living. The data collected by the system is used to establish individual patterns and alert caregivers when relevant changes are detected. A dashboard interface also makes it possible for caregivers and designated responders to proactively ask informed questions about an individual’s health. In all cases, this information is gathered without the

use of cameras or microphones, and in a way that respects the privacy, independence and dignity of the senior.

TLHA is a leader in using advanced technology such as Healthsense to help aging adults maintain their independence while improving their quality of life through enhanced care and reduced healthcare costs. In fact, the Minnesota Department of Human Services and the Minnesota Board on Aging awarded TLHA the 2015 Age and Disabilities Odyssey Innovation Award for its work in this area.

Catherine Berghoff, CGW, Director of Grant Resource Development and Program Administration for TLHA, expressed her enthusiasm for the *Age Well* project in saying, “By partnering with Avinity on the *Age Well* grant, we continue our mission of helping older adults maintain optimum health and independence. The Healthsense™ service, coupled with our strategies for service delivery is a model for providing older adults with extensive support that promotes wellness and enhances lives.”

The implementation phase of the grant has kicked off with staff, caseworker, resident, and family educational sessions. Training and advocacy sessions will continue throughout the two-year project as the technology is installed in the homes of LEE Center residents who opt-in for the program.
